2018 was a year of change for the Bonney Lake Police Department. Chief Dana Powers retired after 26 years of dedicated service to the citizens of Bonney Lake. The new members of our team have hit the ground running and are dedicated to making a difference in Bonney Lake.

The continued commercial growth in Bonney Lake, as well as the residential growth outside of the City limits, contributed to a very busy year for us. Officers responded to just short of 20,000 calls for service during the year which equates to approximately 55 calls per day. The impacts of growth to our area are reflected in traffic congestion and motor vehicle collisions. Traffic safety remains a priority for us and we utilize engineering, education and enforcement to assist us with making our streets safer for the motoring public.

BLPD was very active in the community in 2018. We celebrated Rory Thayse as our little Chief for a Day in August. BLPD also participated in the Shop with a Cop program, National Night Out, Bonney Lake Days, Water Safety education and our 24th annual Citizen's Academy.

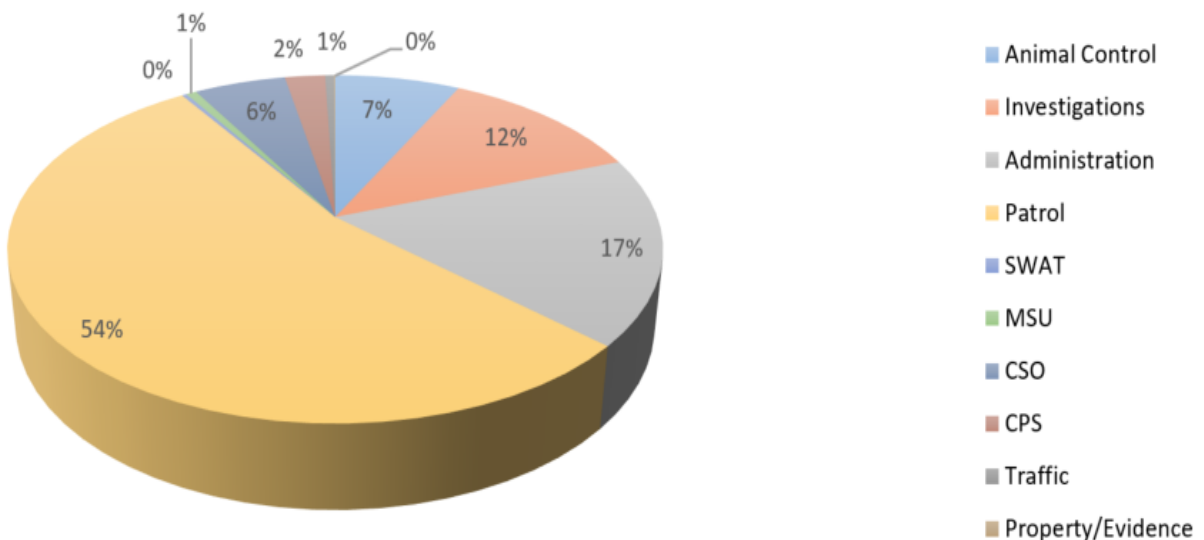

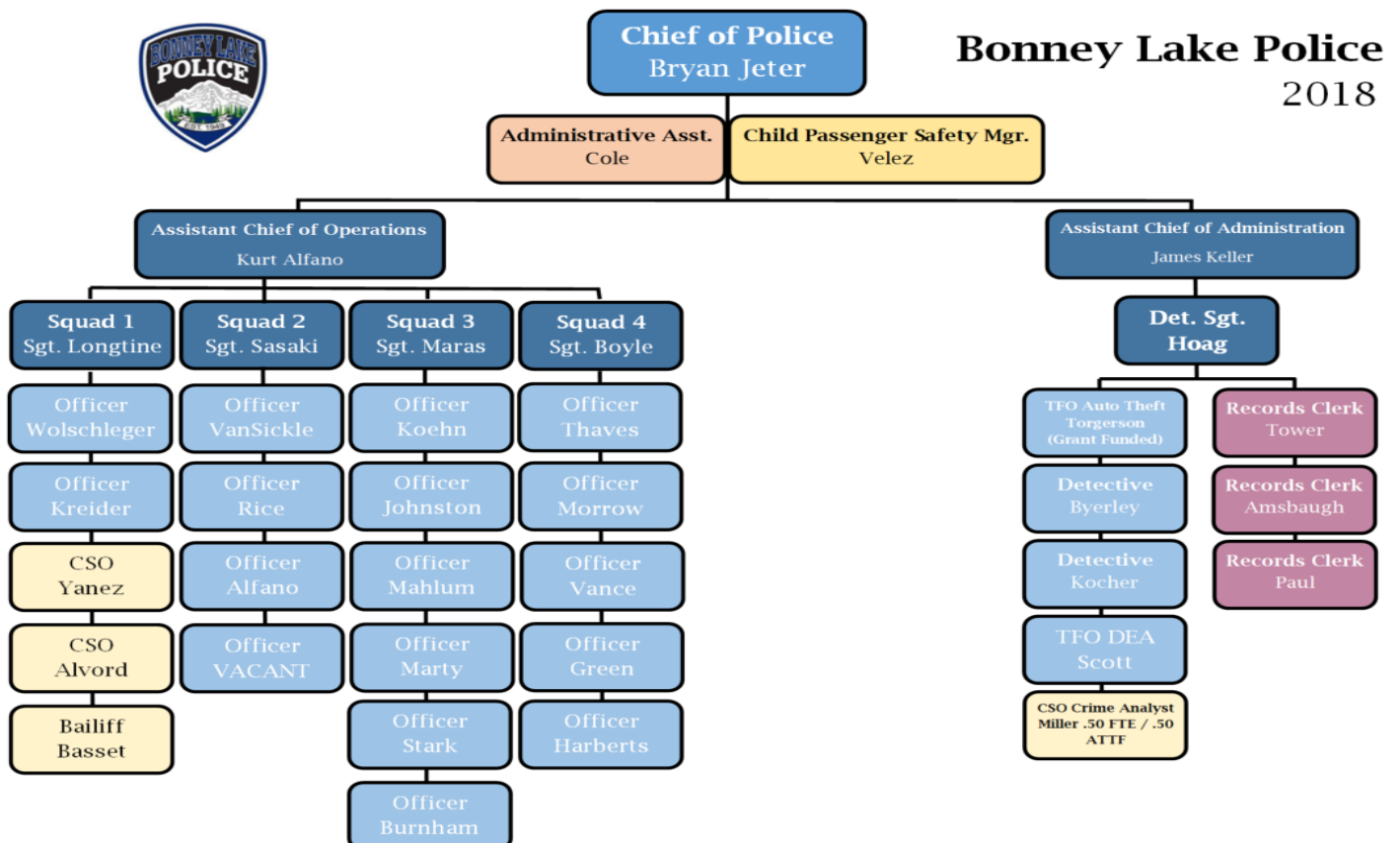


ABOUT BONNEY LAKE PD

Police services are provided by the City of Bonney Lake Police Department. In 2018, the Police Department consisted of 28 commissioned officers and 7.6 civilian support positions. The Bonney Lake Police Department provides the citizens of Bonney Lake with a broad range of law enforcement services. There are three core areas that provide traditional law enforcement services plus several small, specialty units staffed by officers throughout the department on an additional duty basis. The mission of the Bonney Lake Police department is to provide quality law enforcement and preserve the peace within the framework of the Constitution and enforcement of federal, state and municipal law, we embrace the highest principles of public service adhering to legislative standards of fairness, impartiality and equality.

In fulfillment of that mission, the department provides the following services:

- Patrol services, including initial response to calls and coordination of law enforcement services with external agencies;
- Criminal investigations, including investigation of criminal offenses and provision of liaison with other law enforcement agencies, and dissemination of crime information to the public and other agencies;
- Community services, including management of and response to domestic violence and youth-related complaints, provision of education-related services to include crime prevention;
- Tactical and marine specialty services;
- Administrative services including planning and fiscal management, crime analysis, police records, and automated recordkeeping in support of the city, state and federal criminal justice systems; and
- Personnel management services, including internal affairs (complaint investigations), training, and personnel services.





Bonney Lake Police Department 2018 Crime and Statistics Yearly Report

The National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is an incident-based reporting system for crimes known to the police. For each crime incident coming to the attention of law enforcement, a variety of data are collected about the incident. These data include the nature and types of specific offenses in the incident, characteristics of the victim(s) and offender(s), types and value of property stolen and recovered, and characteristics of persons arrested in connection with a crime incident.

The total number of NIBRS offenses reported to Bonney Lake Police Department for 2018 was 996. That is a decrease of 11% compared to 1,114 NIBRS crimes reported in 2016.

Overall NIBRS offenses were down in 2018. Decreases were noted for Robberies from 5 in 2017 to 2 in 2018 (-60%), Intimidation from 4 in 2017 to 2 in 2018 (-50%), Burglaries from 111 in 2017 to 78 in 2018 (-30%), Motor Vehicle Thefts from 57 in 2017 to 43 in 2018 (-25%), and Fraud from 99 in 2017 to 66 in 2018 (-33%).

Increases in reported NIBRS offenses for 2018 included; Non-Force Sex Offenses from 1 in 2017 to 3 in 2018 (200%), Arson from 2 in 2017 to 3 in 2018 (50%), and Extortion/Blackmail from 1 in 2017 to 3 in 2018 (200%).

Several years' worth of data is provided below for historical comparisons.

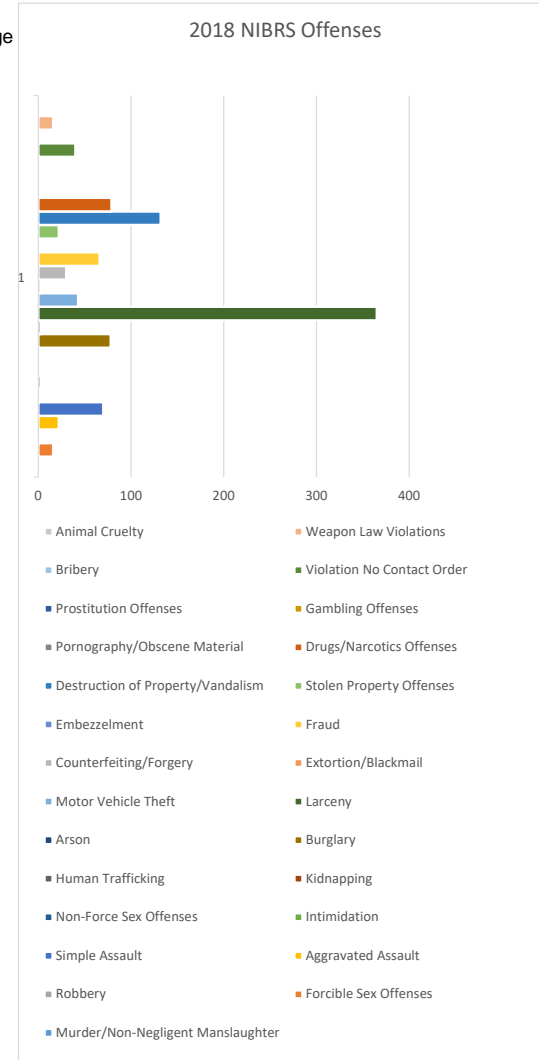

INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The Investigations Unit is staffed by a Detective Sergeant and two general detectives. In addition, the Investigations Unit has a full-time narcotics detective assigned to the DEA task force in Tacoma and a full-time detective assigned to the P.A.T.R.O.L. Auto Theft Task Force. The Investigations Unit successfully cleared 241 total cases in 2018. Most of the cases assigned to the Investigations Unit were felony crimes. In June of 2018, Detective Sergeant Longtine was rotated back to the patrol division and Sergeant Robert Hoag was rotated into the Investigations as the new unit supervisor.

A few highlights for the year by the Investigations Unit:

- Detective Brian Byerley was awarded by the Pierce County Prosecutors Office as the 2018 Detective of the Year Award.
- Detectives worked an extensive organized retail theft investigation involving Home Depots and suspects that were apprehended after a police pursuit in Bonney Lake. The suspect's in this case were responsible for over \$600,000 worth of stolen merchandise from multiple Home Depots in the region.
- Detectives worked a missing persons case involving a juvenile runaway that was abducted and involved in sex trafficking. The juvenile was located and several subjects charged with felony crimes related to this incident.
- Detectives were involved in a Crime Response Unit investigation involving an officer involved shooting in Puyallup.
- Detectives worked a case of identity theft where the suspects were charged with over 30 counts of ID Theft involving multiple victims in the region.

METRO COLLISION RESPONSE TEAM

The Metro Collision Response Team is a part-time, multi-agency collision investigation team that consists of traffic investigators from Lakewood, Puyallup, Bonney Lake, Sumner, Dupont, Milton, Fife and Buckley. MCRT is responsible for responding to and conducting investigations at serious injury and fatality collision scenes in the participating cities. MCRT responded to twenty (20) serious injury or fatality collisions in 2018. MCRT investigated collisions in the following jurisdictions during 2018:

MCRT participated in training in March and August. Officer Buddy Mahlum was added to MCRT in 2018.



DUI TASK FORCE

The Bonney Lake Police Department continued its participation in the Tacoma/Pierce County DUI and Traffic Safety Task Force. The task force is designed for law enforcement agencies in Pierce County to work as a cooperative group to concentrate DUI and traffic enforcement efforts throughout various locations in Pierce County. The DUI Task Force was developed in 1983 when citizens were appointed by Tacoma and Pierce County elected officials to design and implement an education, public information, and enforcement program. Since that time, the program's scope and community involvement has continued to expand and has evolved into today's DUI and Traffic Safety Task Force.

Bonney Lake Traffic & Patrol Officers worked DUI emphasis patrols in Tacoma, University Place, Puyallup, Fife, Bonney Lake/Sumner/Buckley and areas of unincorporated Pierce County. Bonney Lake hosted the DUI Emphasis Patrol on January 20th, 2018. During this emphasis patrol 224 traffic stops were made, 72 NOI's/criminal traffic citations were issued and most importantly 7 DUI arrests were made. The Bonney Lake Police Department continued its participation in the Washington State Patrol's Target Zero Team. Target Zero is the state's strategic highway safety plan, and calls for reducing highway deaths to zero by the year 2030. The entire plan can be found at www.targetzero.com. Enforcement is one of four equal strategies of Target Zero, along with engineering, education and emergency medical service. Grants from the Washington State Traffic Safety Commission reimburse law enforcement agencies' salaries for their involvement in these programs. Sergeant Robert Hoag and Officer Eric Alfano continued to represent Bonney Lake as members of the Target Zero Team. Sergeant Hoag and Officer Alfano made DUI arrests in Tacoma, Puyallup, Bonney Lake, Sumner and Unincorporated Pierce County in 2018. Officer Alfano continued his work as a Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) and used this training to investigate drug impaired drivers in Bonney Lake in addition to assisting other agencies in Pierce County.

TRAFFIC

We had a successful traffic enforcement year as we experienced **zero** traffic related fatalities. Traffic volume is on the increase in the City of Bonney Lake however we experienced a decrease in reportable traffic collisions in 2018. We investigated 290 reportable traffic collisions in 2018. 68 of these reported collisions involved at least one injury. This was down from 74 the year before. The total number of reportable collisions decreased from 306 reportable collisions the year before. We were down to only one full time traffic officer during 2018 after Traffic Officer Vince Sainati retired. The traffic unit issued 596 infractions/citations in 2018.

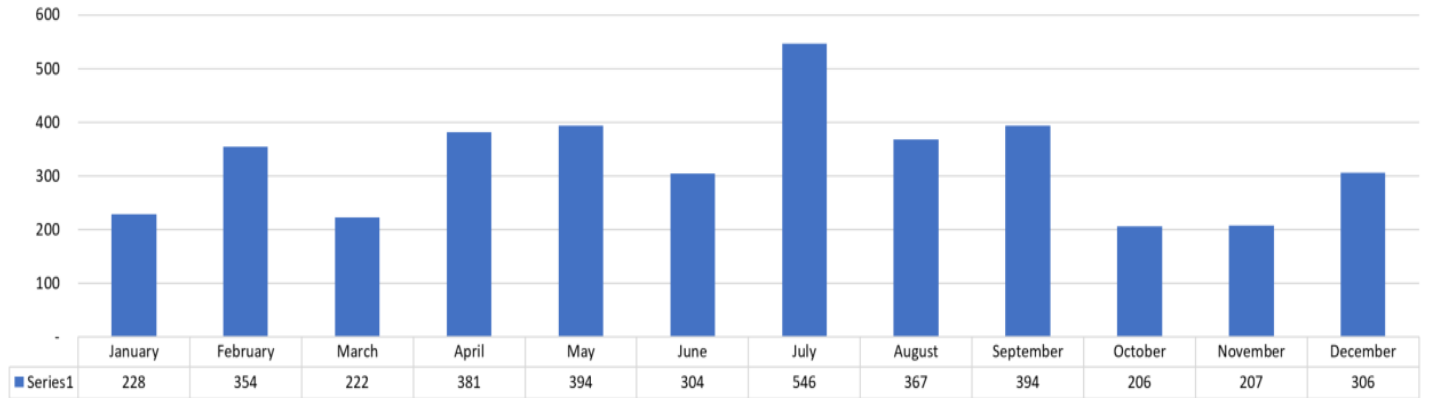
Distracted Driving

Officers issued 113 infractions/citations in school zones, wrote 262 distracted driving tickets, 1210 speeding tickets and processed 51 impaired drivers. As an entire department, Bonney Lake Officers issued 3519 traffic infractions/citations. In addition to traffic enforcement, the traffic unit was involved in education events during the Bonney Lake Citizens Academy and assisted with traffic control for numerous community events during the year. Traffic units assisted with the 5K Sumner School District Fun Run, Bonney Lake Days, Labor of Love Triathlon, Halloween event in Sky Island and the 5K Tour-de-Lights Fun Run. This year we announced special traffic emphasis patrols designed to address specific traffic safety concerns. Several of these emphasis patrols focused on traffic safety priorities.

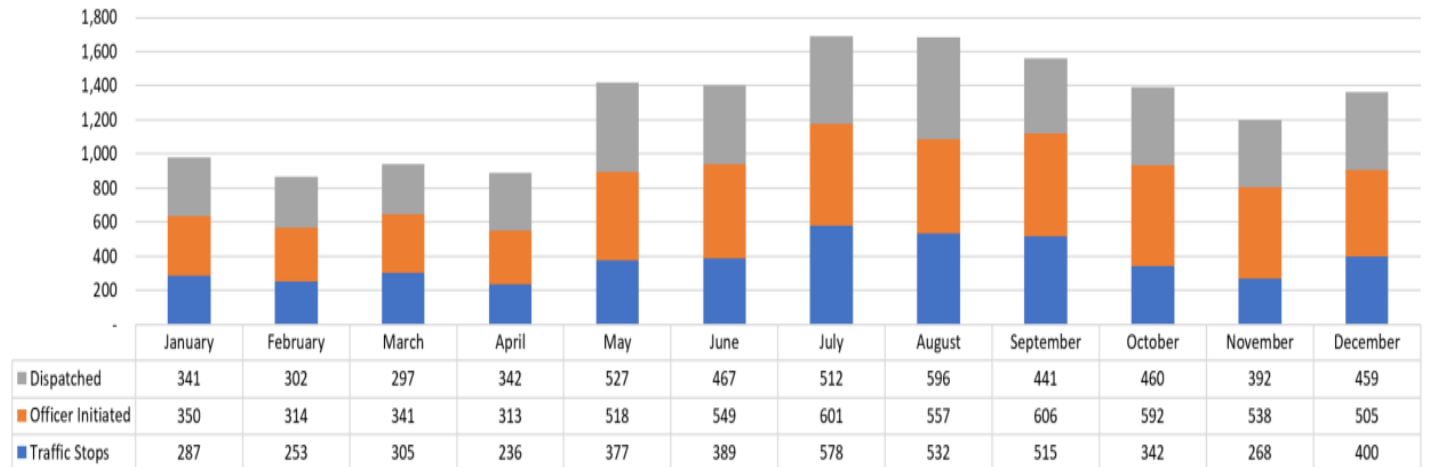
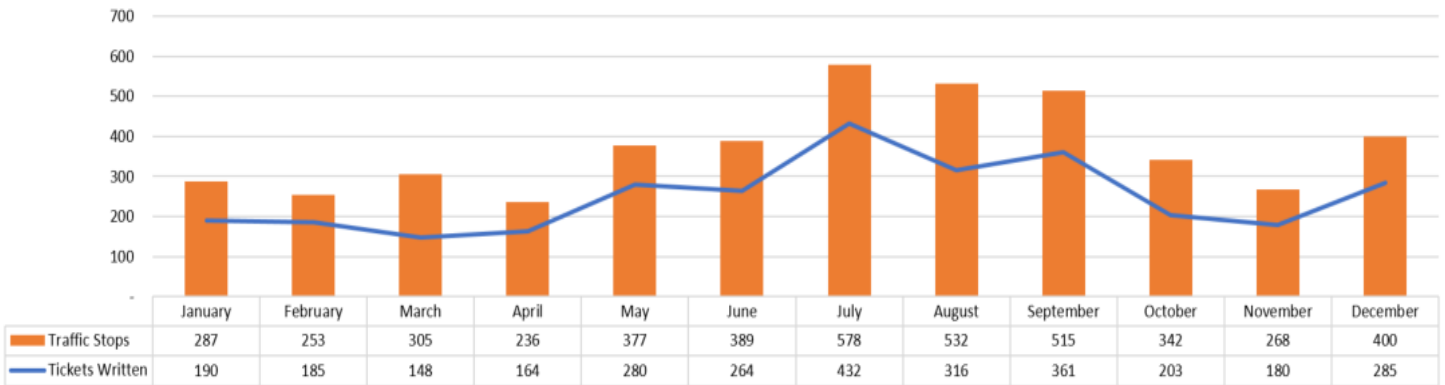

MARINE SERVICES UNIT

All Marine Service Officers are required to complete annual training at the start of each year. The Bonney Lake Police Marine Unit continues to be the lead marine Training Agency in Pierce County. In 2018, the Bonney Lake Marine Unit hosted joint training with Kent Police, Lakewood Police and Black Diamond Police on Lake Tapps. The ten hour training day began at the Sumner YMCA, where officers swam several laps, treaded water for five minutes, simulate a downed swimmer rescue, and honed their skills at throwing life rings and rescue bags. After a morning of pool training, officers moved to Lake Tapps, where they practiced trailering the police boat and launching it from the trailer. Officers completed on the water maneuvering through an obstacle course and completed high-speed rapid turn maneuvers. Officers also responded to a simulated downed swimmer within the swim area at Allan Yorke Park. The officers learned how to navigate the boat over the swim area buoy lines safely.

BUOY MAINTENANCE

The Marine Unit inspected every City owned buoy, replacing two which were missing; using one new buoy, and another that had been refurbished. Officers replaced two failing navigation lights in the channels north of Inter Lake Islands. Additionally, a new navigation light was placed on a buoy near the Allan Yorke Park boat ramp; alerting boaters to the swim area. At the end of the boating season, two new buoys were purchased and will be placed on Lake Tapps in 2019.

Community Service Officers of the Bonney Lake Police Department continued to provide excellent support working with our Patrol Officers, Sergeants and Command Staff in 2018. Community Service Officers (CSO's) also worked to promote Crime Prevention and Community Oriented Policing in both the residential and business community.

Although CSO's have a wide range of duties and responsibilities there are several which can be considered primary that included: prisoner transports, Court security, property room management and crime analysis.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

Throughout 2018, Officers, CSO's and Police Volunteers participated in a variety of community and school events to include: Bonney Lake Days, National Night Out, Citizen's Academy, Open House, Scout Night and Shop with a Cop, to name a few. CSO's also attended three block watch meetings this year.



CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY

The Bonney Lake Police Department houses the Project Manager for Washington’s Child Passenger Safety Program, Cesi Velez. She oversees the state’s child passenger safety activities. The goals of the program are to provide child restraint inspection services, support the network of child passenger safety technicians, and maintain ongoing efforts to keep children traveling safely in cars.

There was a total of 14 four-day CPST courses held on both the West and East side of the mountains in the following counties; Benton, Chelan, Clallam, Cowlitz, Grant, King, Lewis, Kitsap, Mason, Pierce (2), Snohomish, Spokane and Walla Walla. There was also a renewal course held in King County. These trainings provided a total of 133 car seat technicians for Washington State; plus another three attended a course in Oregon, for a total of 136. These courses also provided the following: eight technicians for Idaho, two technicians for Oregon, one technician for Montana. Washington currently has a total of 478 car seat technicians. This includes 24 CPST Instructors and 10 Proxy. One of the 14 courses was focused on training tribal members and service providers with representation from Chehalis, Muckleshoot, Squaxin and Skokomish. Monetary support was also provided to Yakama and Colville to send members to become car seat technicians and additional support was provided to Colville to host a car seat inspection event.

Both Records Clerk Amsbaugh and Records Clerk Tower participated in the annual Shop with a Cop held at Target.

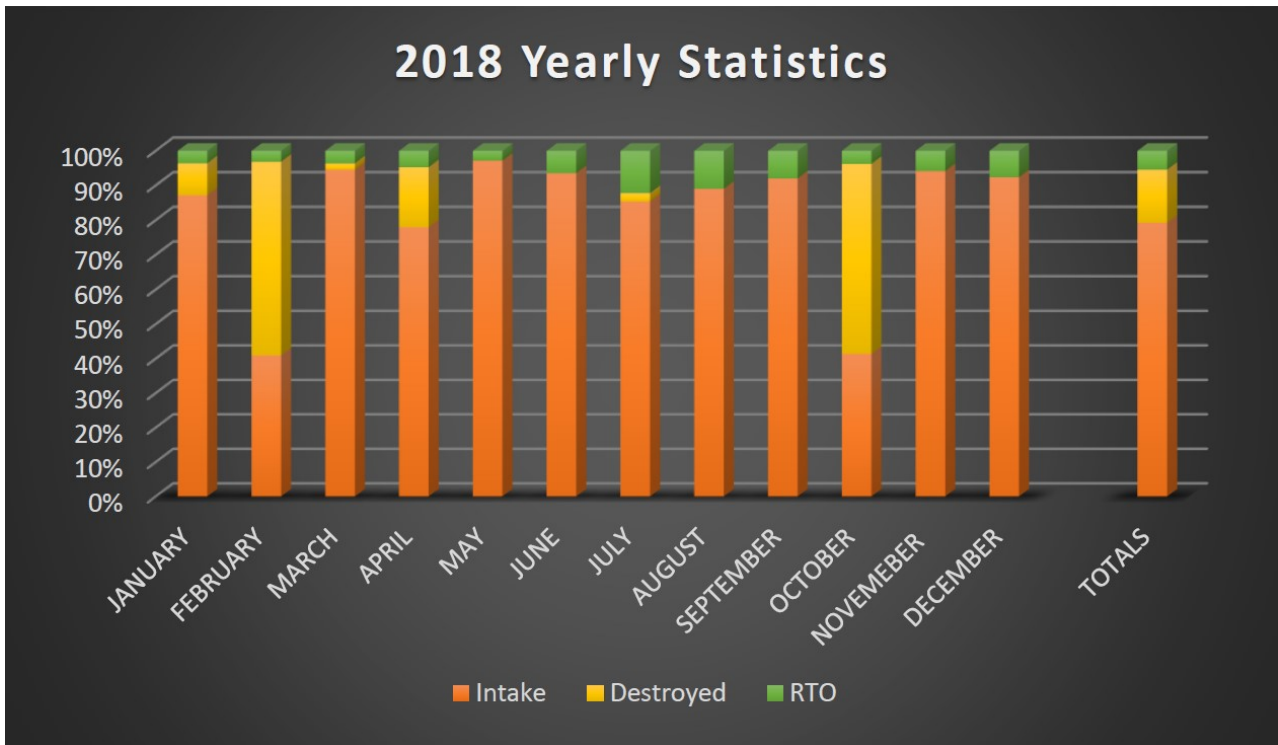
Records Clerk Amsbaugh continues to serve on the city's Social Media Group, which involves her posting on the Bonney Lake Police Facebook and Twitter pages.

PROPERTY ROOM

The property room began the year with the annual appropriated property audit. There are 55 items appropriated to various officers or work spaces within the department. Three (3) items were destroyed, sent to auction and/or depleted through department training with all other items accounted for.



We received into our evidence room approximately **1266** items for 2018. We processed Return To Owner (RTO) requests which resulted in the release of **87** items to applicable owners/victims.

The property room has continued to strive to maintain effective property room management by the disposing of evidence that is no longer required to be retained in the evidence room. Through case research, we were able to dispose **244** items for 2018.

In April of 2018 we successfully completed our conversion to our property management barcode scanning program. This process required entering every piece of evidence that is currently stored in the property room into the new system and a complete restructuring of the property room. While this process took a quite some time (over 4 years) we were able to perform a complete audit of the evidence room during this time with all items being accounted for.

There was a total of 22 items that went to Propertyroom.com for auction that generated a total of \$468.52 in additional revenue for the City.

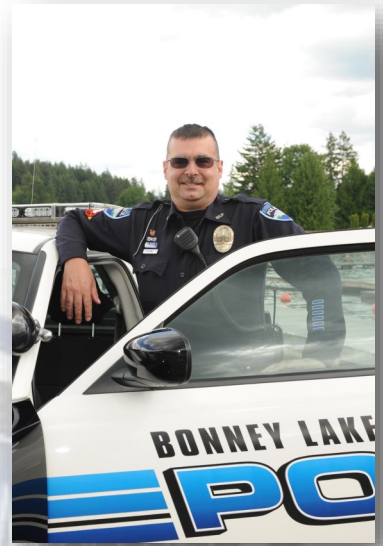

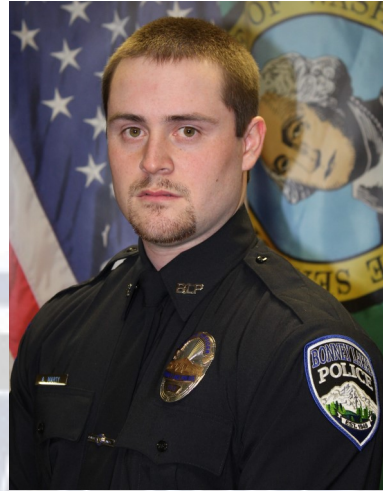

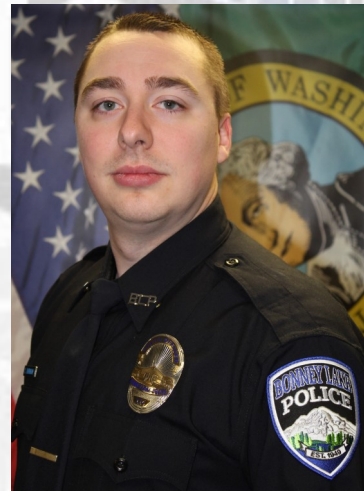
